## NEW WAVE READERS A guide for authors

#### STARTER LEVEL

#### 1 General

These notes should be read in conjunction with the INTRODUCTION TO THE SERIES.

The age range of the projected STARTER audience is 11-13.

Within the STARTER range, two levels are proposed: Level 1, readable by students during their first year of learning English; Level 2, readable by students who have completed their first year of learning English. In broad language terms, Level 1 authors may use only the Present tenses; Level 2 authors may use the simple Past as well. (A detailed inventory of available structures for each level appears in Section 2 of these notes.)

Level 1 titles should not exceed 1,000 words in length, Level 2 should not exceed 2,000 words. Extents will be 16pp for each level (14pp of text).

The relationship between text and visuals is of especial importance at STARTERS level. Authors should consider telling the story by means of comic strips. A number of possibilities exist, viz.:

### 1 Comic strips alone



2 Comic strips + narrative links



## 3 Comic strips + prose narrative

When submitting an outline and sample, authors should indicate which of these formats they would prefer to use. Authors should plan in terms of two-page spreads, with four pictures for each spread.

### 2 Available structures

Structural grading is not the only factor in the process of grading for readability in NEW WAVE READERS. Neverthless, some basic structural control is desirable. The following suggestions for such control at Starters level should be treated as guidelines rather than rigid rules.

The following structures are freely available at the STARTER level:
